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Admin Responds to Student Walkout

On May 6, students from Boston Latin School and ten other high schools walked out of class in support of a ceasefire in the ongoing Israel-Hamas conflict in Gaza.

As part of the Boston Students Palestine Coalition, students from high schools across the Boston area, including BLS, Boston Latin Academy and Cambridge Rindge and Latin School, organized and attended the walkout. The coalition planned the walkout a week beforehand and publicized it through social media platforms such as Instagram on May 3.

On the day of the walkout, BLS students left school after R5 and teachers supervised them to ensure that they did not interrupt classes. Students walked together to the MBTA Green Line and Boston Commons, carrying signs that called for a ceasefire in Gaza. Later in the day, they went to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology pro-Palestine encampment to continue their protest.

The following evening, students who had participated in the walkout were notified by email that they would each receive three detentions for missing two class periods the day before, a standard disciplinary action at BLS.

On May 9, after school, following the notification of disciplinary action, Head of School Jason Gallagher hosted a meeting with those students to discuss the walkout, respond to student concerns and answer questions. During the meeting, he apologized for the administration's lack of communication with the students before the detentions were issued and revoked the detentions. Head of School Gallagher expressed that he was very appreciative that students conversed with him after school. He summarizes, "It was really wonderful for me to

School Choice Shot Down

On May 22, the Boston Public School Committee voted to once again opt out of the 1994 School Choice Program that would allow non-resident students into Boston Public Schools.

The School Choice Program is a statewide initiative that emerged after Massachusetts enacted the Education Reform change in Massachusetts in respect to how the Commonwealth managed educational

services by local school districts and sought to close the gap within education across

BPS has chosen to opt out of this program for the past 30 years due to the possibility of hindering their ability to prioritize students living in Boston.

In an interview with the Boston Herald, Superintendent Mary Skipper notes, "On the plane they say put on your oxygen mask and do what you have to do. This reform was a dramatic pecially our Black and brown students, but we're just not at the point where we can do

Their reasoning is categorized into four main groups: student assignment issues, space, cost and the decisions of neighboring communities. Firstly, a large number of students enroll into BPS schools each year, and families outside of the United States continue to relocate to Boston throughout the year. As a result, BPS could not guarantee that all families moving to Boston would have a seat, as schools may not have the physical capacity to host a new influx of students.

The next issue is costs and budgets, which include special education classes, English as a Second Language programs and transportation. Since many neighboring districts lack such resources, a predictably large portion of students will seek them, resulting in unbudgeted costs and less accessibility.

In the past, districts neighboring Boston, such as Cambridge, Brookline, Chelsea, Dedham, Needham, Milton, Somerville and Revere, have chosen to opt out of this program. By opting in, BPS could be opening seats within their schools without any reciprocity.

Boston Latin School AP Economics teacher and Boston Teachers Union (BTU) representative Mr. Patrick Boor mentions that while he does not support opting into the program, "the number one issue is that [parents] should have a school in their community that is meeting their needs, and the fact that they have to search out of their district is something that we need to work on

Conversations, however, have shifted within the School Committee due to falling

enrollment rates within BPS, which causedww a decrease in state funding. Opting into the School Choice Program may therefore stabilize enrollment and help with the bud-

Newton has been a big player in this resurgence of the School Choice debate and had even proposed to run a pilot program allowing 70 students outside of the district to attend Newton Public Schools. It was, however, voted down and never went into

BLS Assistant to the Head of School and BTU representative Ms. Martha Pierce asserts, "I think it was great to revisit it this year, because I don't think that anybody has taken a careful look and we don't know exactly what it would be like because we've never done it."

An example of an active desegregation program is the Metropolitan Council for Educational Opportunity, where students from underprivileged families enter a lottery system to have the chance to attend a school in a different city.

Cynthia Wang (III) was one such student who was able to attend a public school in Newton through the program. Wang shares, "The people were great and the community was great, but the biggest thing was mostly the distance. The commute was a bit harder and none of my friends were nearby, and so if I wanted to hang out with anyone, it would be like a half an hour drive."

Although the School Choice Program was decidedly voted down by the Boston School Committee, an important conversation regarding equity within education continues on.

Ms. Harari



After nine years of working as a librarian for the Harry V. Keefe Library, Ms. Susan Harari is retiring.

Although most students know her for checking people in for study hall or telling them to put their phones away, her central role is collaborating with teachers to help students learn research skills and maintaining the digital imprint collection of the library.

In her years at BLS, Ms. Harari, along with Ms. Deeth Ellis, has vastly improved the library. Over 75 percent of the print collection is new and the library has become more flexible and student-centered.

Boston Busing Crisis: 50 Years

This June marks the 50-year anniversary of the desegregation of Boston Public Schools and the subsequent busing crisis.

Prior to the Racial Inclusion Act of 1965, neighborhoods and schools in Boston were heavily segregated because of redlining, the discriminatory practice of refusing loans to non-white homebuyers. School demographics subsequently reflected neighborhoods varied by race and class. Boston Latin School had a predominantly white student population.

Former BPS teacher and administrator Mr. Jerry Howland started his career in the '70s at the McCormack Middle School—which mostly consisted of Black American students. He recalls, "It wasn't until I came back after I graduated from college and took a job teaching where I realized how segregated the Boston schools were [...] I didn't know that the school system was doing it to [that degree]."

After the act was passed, the Boston School Committee (BSC) did not make plans to integrate, which led to the case of *Morgan v. Hennigan*. In 1972, a group of Black American parents sued the BSC on behalf of their children who were enrolled in BPS, claiming that the segregated school district denied Black American students educational equity.

On June 21, 1974, Judge Wendell Arthur Garrity Jr. ruled that segregation was unconstitutional and ordered all BPS schools to desegregate immediately. The

proposed solution was to send students on buses to attend schools outside of their neighborhoods.

Busing, however, only heightened racial tensions and was poorly received by all. White students were reluctant to attend schools with less resources located farther away from their homes. Black American students, meanwhile, faced abuse from outraged white parents who protested violently. Police officers had to escort Black American students to South Boston, where protestors pelted the buses and yelled slurs. As a result, dissatisfied parents moved their children to private or parochial schools, and more than 30,000 students left BPS.

BLS U.S. History and Modern Boston teacher Ms. Robin Kirkpatrick says, "One of the concerns raised by black and white parents alike in 1974 was that absent a real effort to build better schools for all of Boston's kids, confidence in the system as a whole would continue to suffer. [...] Busing alone did little to improve the quality of Boston's schools, even if it seemed to provide a 'remedy' for the very real problem of segregation."

The ruling also stated that exam schools like BLS were required to have at least 35 percent of spots allocated for minority students, stirring white residents. In 1995, white father Michael McLaughlin filed a lawsuit against the BSC on behalf of his daughter, Julia, after she was rejected from BLS. He argued that since Julia scored higher on the BLS entrance exam than some minority students, her rejection was a violation of her 14th Amendment rights. Over two decades after ordering for the desegregation of BPS, Judge Garrity ruled in

favor of McLaughlin in 1996, allowing Julia to attend BLS starting in the eighth grade.

In 1998, following McLaughlin v. Boston School Committee, the ruling which required 35 percent of exam school students to be minorities was overturned, yet again changing schools' racial demographics. Currently, 36 percent of BLS students are white, compared to 15 percent in the whole district. Many schools are still racially unbalanced, as exam schools like BLS have a larger population of white students. At some other schools, however, more than 90 percent of students are students of color.

Ms. Kirkpatrick remarks, "It is absolutely better for Boston's kids and the city as a whole that schools are integrated. Debate

remains as to whether Judge Garrity's plan to achieve this was the most effective mechanism for doing so."

At BLS, students taking Facing History and Ourselves and U.S. History learn about busing and how integration has shaped BLS and BPS. Busing provided a temporary solution but did not improve racial demographics permanently.

BLS History Program Director Mr. Thomas Kennelly concludes, "It's important for students to have [a] full history. You know, sometimes we like to learn more of the positive stories as opposed to difficult stories [...] But it is more important for the students to learn difficult histories in addition to more 'feel good' histories."

On May 6, Boston Latin School faculty voted for the School's six allotted representatives for the Boston Teachers Union (BTU), who attend monthly meetings and sometimes negotiate contracts.

BTU is the smaller of two major teachers unions in Massachusetts, with members in Boston and surrounding towns such as Lynn, Lawrence and Salem. It aims to create better teaching environments and give teachers a voice in policy decisions. Each school's elections, which are accessible to all faculty members, are held in May outside of school hours.

BLS Latin teacher Mr. John Kerpan was chosen for one of these positions, the number of which are granted based on school size. While negotiations with Boston Public Schools can be difficult, he wishes there was not so much pushback against the existence of unions, as he has seen how much work they do to

create positive teaching environments

His overall experience as a representative has felt effective, especially in the school community. He shares, "At BLS, the teachers and the administration are largely on the same page," which allows for productive discussion and change-making. Though many assume that the union focuses on educators only, the BTU also advocates for students, even supplying housing for homeless children.

Elections for the president of the

BTU will also commence as the current leader, Jessica Tang, steps down from the presidency and takes over the American Federation of Teachers (AFT) Massachusetts, a branch of the national union. Mr. Kerpan shared that she was successful due to her organizing skills and enthusiasm for bringing people together towards one goal. Elected in 2017, Jessica Tang was the first LGBTQ+ person to hold this position and will be the first person of color to head the AFT Massachusetts.

Lea-Antoinette Serena is the BTU's elementary representative and acts as a support person for elementary school teachers in organizing and negotiating contracts. She echoes Mr. Kerpan's sentiment and says, "[Tang] supported the union in becoming less of a service model and more of an organizing model."

Serena explains that her biggest interest in education is advocating so that teachers can be their best possible selves for students. She continues that Tang's identity led to "more diversity in leadership at all levels" because, "in a city that serves [many] students of color [...], we should have educators and leaders who look like our students." Seeing a woman of color in such a high position inspired Serena to get involved.

Vice president Erik Berg will take over the BTU in July until elections take place in two years; his old position will be filled in a special election next October. As contract negotiations continue this spring, the biggest current efforts are for increased paraprofessional salaries and a better allocation of resources, such as making school buildings safer and increasing mental health support.

BLS Student Council president Neil Jin (I) explains, because of its cooperation with educators' ideas, "the BTU has led to the BPS district being one of the best places for teachers to work in the country."

Susan Chen (I) Wins Amazon Future Engineer

On April 20, Susan Chen (I) won the Amazon Future Engineer Scholarship

After hearing about the scholar-ship from a friend, she decided to apply. Susan was selected as one of 400 scholars to receive a scholarship of up to 40,000 dollars and a paid internship at *Amazon*.

In December of 2023, Chen began her application process and recalls that "the application itself [doesn't] have that many questions, but instead, it amasses simple and thoughtful college-level questions that are [often] asked during college admissions."

Partnering with Scholarship America, *Amazon* created this program to open up new career opportunities and provide new initiatives for computer science, aimed at students

from disadvantaged backgrounds. They chose scholars based on their academic achievement, leadership, extracurricular activities, work experience and future goals.

Students are encouraged to apply to a variety of scholarship opportunities because of the high sticker price of colleges with the tuition, room and board of many private universities often reaching 90,000 dollars per year. Internship opportunities, furthermore, are highly valued — especially at a major technology company such as *Amazon* which boasts an acceptance rate of less than ten percent.

Boston Latin School Science Department Head Ms. Kathleen Bateman adds, "Students should apply for every award available because a student [who is] high achieving often [forgets] how special they are as individuals, and [teachers] are glad that this uniqueness is recognized by external partners and external organizations."

In 2019, *Amazon* launched the Future Engineer scholarship program and has given out over 54 million dollars to students in scholarships.

Students who are currently enrolled in, or have completed, a high school or college dual degree course focused on computer science, engineering or robotics are eligible to apply for the scholarship.

BLS AP Physics C: Mechanics teacher Mr. Jesse Southwick, who wrote Chen's recommendation letter for the scholarship, comments, "Chen was an excellent physics student who worked hard to learn physics and to get better [...] so I'm sure that she would make a great engineer."

Chen had originally decided to major in computer engineering but heard that there was a broad scope of learning in electrical engineering because it contains both computer science and electrical engineering courses in one major. After putting some thought into doing a double major, she has decided that she would like to major in electrical engineering with a minor in computer science.

Chen has committed to Boston University, where she will be attending this fall. She hopes to make use of the valuable job experience she will gain from the internship at *Amazon*.

Winning this scholarship means a lot to Chen, and she offers advice to underclassmen: "Make sure [to] take opportunities that [you] think that [you] don't have a chance at because [you'll] never know what can happen."

Relieving Stress With PAW Day

The event aimed to provide students an op-

portunity to participate in activities, thus allowing them to take a break from academic classes. BLS school psychologist Dr. Vanessa Prosper shares, "This year, the theme was really about engaging students in activities that increase their joy and wellness."

The Wellness Council is a student-led team at school that works in tandem with mental health-specialized staff. They develop and guide school-based practices and systems that improve school health.

The event arose through a series of monthly meetings during W blocks. After much brainstorming and communicating between the members of the Wellness Council, the idea of having a day for students to take a break from being in the classroom was formed.

Dr. Prosper shares, "We can develop programming. That will support students' mental health. Either through raising awareness about mental

health or talking about ways to better navigate your emotional difficulties in terms of coping skills."

In addition to planning the PAW day event, the Wellness Council also provides students at BLS with a variety of other mental health resources. Assistant Head of School Jaffrie Perrotti, an administrative organizer for the event and a member of the committee, remarks, "We gave up social-emotional tips of the month through the newsletter. That was a website put up by the end of the year to increase awareness, among staff, things they could do in their classroom to improve the overall wellness."

At the conclusion of the event, surveys on The Daily Bulletin were sent out to students and teachers to reflect on their experience during PAW Day. BLS social worker Ms. Winnie Wang states, "Of the teachers that responded, 100 percent of them said that they would want to see it happen again, and of the students that responded, around 96 percent said they would like to see it happen again."

Venmo, credit card and cash. With the variety of skills learned throughout the program, the company owners were able to interact with buyers and successfully sell their products.


Nicole Lin (IV) purchased an ube brownie mix from one of the businesses.

Big-Backed": Funny or Problematic?

Generation Z (Gen Z) is often described as "woke," taking pride in their knowledge of current events, racial prejudice and discrimination. The "cancel culture" era between 2020 and 2022 is a perfect example of this, when influencers and celebrities were held accountable for their statements and actions more than ever before. During this time, many in Gen Z grew wary of being on the wrong side of topics such as body size, race, sexuality and politics to avoid being viewed as problematic. Others began expressing their annoyance, however, at those who took jokes too seriously. As more people become frustrated with "cancel culture," there has been a rise in potentially offensive terms such as "big-backed" among the younger generation.

The phrase "big-backed" has become popular among Gen Z. The term first became famous through TikTok, where it was used as a joking phrase to describe those who eat a lot. As this trend made it to a darker side of TikTok, however, it is now often used as a way to indirectly fat-shame people online. It is necessary for all to be cautious when people use the term in this way, because it can consequently promote fatphobia.

Although this trend mostly consists of eating challenges or people humorously showcasing their appetite, there are some

harmful parts to it. Calling someone fat has become normalized, which gives rise to self-consciousness over eating habits out of fear of being fat-shamed. People also use this term in situations beyond its intended meaning. Olurimi Alofe (II) explains, "If it gets excessive, like every single time you see someone eating you're like 'oh you're a big back' or 'that's big-backed behavior', then it starts to become a little more serious." Considering the lack of awareness of possible insecurities within others, constantly making "big-backed" jokes about someone can lead to them gaining a toxic relationship with food, unhealthy eating habits or a deteriorating mental health.

The fatphobia present in these jokes is also shown through what happens on TikTok. Plus-sized people that have participated in the trend on TikTok often receive disrespectful commentary regarding their weight, as opposed to the collective amusement seen on a video of a skinnier person making the same joke. Romilda Miranda (II) explains, "Fatphobia in its purest form, whether you think it's exaggerated or not, is just speaking negatively of being fat or being afraid of being fat. It's literally in the name." Because of fatphobia, people are influenced by weight bias, in which fat individuals making jokes about being "big" are seen as scary, while those who fit the beauty standards regarding weight aren't bullied despite similar contexts. We should be careful not to stray from the original meaning of these jokes, which are not meant to antagonize anyone.

A similar phrase popularized on the internet was "girl dinner," further demonstrating the negative path that originally

funny slangs can take. This trend originally began with people showing random combinations of food and snacks thrown together, using them to substitute a full meal. As the trend continued, however, it became more about portion sizes. Videos on "girl dinners" began to show increasingly smaller portions of food or nothing at all. This romanticized the toxic eating habits of many young social media users, further exacerbating people's eating disorders and body dysmorphia.

The "big back" trend has the potential to face a similar fate. People may hesitate to show their true meals or make a playful joke about themselves, and instead exaggerate the trend by eating too much or too little, which are both unhealthy.

Phrases like "big-backed," however, if used appropriately as friendly banter, can be a way to break the ice within groups and make people more comfortable with each other. It has been proven that using slang and having inside jokes have made people closer. Furthermore, the phrase will likely die out soon, as every slang terminology does, and therefore is not a serious concern. Shriya Chan (II) comments, "I bet in the next two years [...] it's not going to be a slang or a common slang anymore."

Although people mostly use the phrase in a non-demeaning manner amongst their friend groups, we are unaware of the insecurities people are battling internally. It is important to establish how comfortable someone is with this phrase, and respect those who are offended. Chan adds, "We should still use the term, but obviously keep an open mind of who you're saying it to." After all, no one likes to constantly be the butt of the joke.



The Met Gala: All Hype, No Help

Zendaya strides in with a stunning, glittering blue gown. Cardi B's glamorous designers were given a chance to showcase dress floods the ground like a dark, rolling storm. Doja Cat struts in with ... a wet T-shirt? You've just tuned in to *Vogue*'s live stream of the Met Gala. Anna Wintour, the editor-in-chief of Vogue, hosts this event every May to raise money for the Metropolitan Museum of Art's Costume Institute, which is located in New York. Each year, celebrities and designers flock to the event to show off their outfits and socialize with other high-profile stars. Their outfits are also supposed to fit a theme ranging from "Camp" in 2019 to "The Garden of Time" this year. Despite these exciting features, the Met Gala shouldn't be supported, as its purpose for charity has been dulled by the focus on celebrities' wealth and prestige.

Year after year, celebrities' superficial interpretations of the Met Gala dress code and theme continue to disappoint spectators. With "The Garden of Time" as the dress code, people expected Met Gala guests to show up with unique ideas of the renewing cycle of life and the fleeting nature of

time. Many celebrities, however, showed up in outfits that didn't seem to resemble the dress code at all, with some participants wearing basic suits or gowns. While their art, the simplicity of the celebrities' interpretations didn't meet the standards of many viewers, nor did it inspire others.

The theme, additionally, was more complex than just "nature." It was based on J.G. Ballard's 1962 short story "The Garden of Time"that tells the story of a wealthy couple holding off the approach of a mob by using time-manipulating flowers. When they finally run out of flowers, the couple meets their demise. The story, seen as a critique of the wealthy and capitalism as a whole, is ironic, considering the stars of the Met Gala are incredibly rich.

Maura Hatala (I), whose Senior Capstone relates to women's fashion, comments, "Most people ignored the commentary on consumerism [in the theme] and just went straight for nature, and everybody was wearing flowers and greenery."

When celebrities do not engage in the deeper social commentary present in the theme, it becomes clear that the ostensible purpose of the gala, to spark intellectual curiosity and showcase art, is secondary to celebrity worship.

One of the Met Gala's supposed goals is to open up opportunities for new designers to display their talents. Unfortunately, because designers attract celebrities to wear their designs by offering free tickets, smaller designers who cannot afford this cost are not able to present their work. The result is that most brands in the gala are already well-established, such as Gucci and Valentino. Thus, smaller designers who were supposed to be highlighted at this event thus do not get the necessary attention and popularity to succeed in the industry.

Since the Met's Costume Institute also needs the money earned from the gala to fund its operations, it excuses the controversial behaviors of the attendees, ranging from dating scandals to acts of racism, in order to keep them attending. While the gala does raise huge amounts of money, its focus has gradually dropped away from protecting fashion's past.

BLS history teacher Mr. Dominic Rinaldi says, "To go rogue simply to call more attention to one's own brands seems a bit disingenuous and distracts away from

what the purpose is." Its lavish veil muffles the sincerity of honoring and preserving fashion's history.

Some may argue that the Met Gala orks well because it takes money from the rich under the guise of being charitable and uses fans' devotion to celebrities to spread awareness of the Institute's collections. While supporting fashion institutes is important, more pressing issues, such as poverty and disease, exist in the world that deserve as big of a platform. Too often, similar galas and events trying to raise money for these causes are overpowered by the Met Gala.

It is vital to understand that fans and viewers have the power to change where fame and attention are directed and can opt to support more deserving causes. Mr. Rinaldi adds, "We need to ultimately break the cycle, but as long as we continue to consume the product, it's never done."

Although it is tempting to continue following the Met Gala, people should focus on charities that impact the world more substantially. This is the difference between stuffing cash into an already-rich organization and saving lives across the

As a student progresses through their high school career, they will eventually become old enough to obtain a transformational item in their lives: a driver's license. This license grants them the right to drive a car wherever they want, as long as they follow the rules. Although some are skeptical about the need to drive in one's teenage years, this ability leads to numerous benefits.

With the ability to drive comes a plethora of responsibilities on and off the road. Drivers have to make sure they are obeying all the traffic laws, driving safely and being aware of other vehicles on the road. They also have to be mindful of the costs of owning and maintaining a vehicle.

Boston Latin School Classics teacher Ms. Catherine Foley comments, "You need to worry about [car] insurance, maintenance and gas money. [E]ven if you think you're spending enough money to just buy the car itself, you also need to be financially aware that you have all these other expenses [...] like [...] wear and tear [and] stuff like that."

These new responsibilities, though they may seem stressful, help students manage tasks and become more aware of their surroundings, as newly ordained drivers are forced to handle the many moving parts that go into operating a car.

One might argue that with the rise of apps like *Uber* and *Lyft*, the need for students to learn how to drive has diminished since they can simply book a driver on an app and go anywhere. Individuals have more freedom, however, if they drive themselves, as they are directly behind the

wheel. For many, taking an *Uber* or a *Lyft* causes passengers to have increased anxiety, as they have to worry about the rideshare driver and their skill level.

Sebastian Inezian (II), who has a learner's permit, elaborates, "Maybe in the short term [Uber and Lyft] are beneficial, [b]ut just having your own car and being able to have more of a personal liberty to do whatever you want is definitely more important."

For students who view privacy as a factor, driving can improve their sense of security, particularly within the context of lackluster public transit system in Boston. A poll from September 2023 found that most Boston residents feel that the MBTA is unsafe, and more people would use the MBTA if the service was more reliable. The MBTA is dealing with disinvestment and deferred maintenance, which leads to safety issues — hardly reassuring for prospective riders.

Ms. Foley elaborates on the role of her car when it comes to security: "I [...] use it as my alone time [...] I consider it like my little private space where I can think about the day [and] no one's going to bother me if I don't want them to."



For many high schoolers, getting a driver's license is a major milestone. It supposedly signifies that one is now responsible and begins the transition from childhood to adulthood. How important is it actually to learn to drive? For those at Boston Latin School, it is simply unnecessary, costly and dangerous for the environment. This is echoed by nearly 73 percent of juniors and seniors at BLS who have not gotten their driver's license.

In Boston, driving as a teen is an expensive ordeal. All teens must first pay approximately 1,000 dollars for a driver's education. Then, many will need to buy cars, and insurance for Boston teens is on average 2,997 dollars a year, according to MarketWatch — nearly three times more expensive than insurance for drivers over the age of 25. Gas and maintenance costs to keep a car running further burden high school students and their families. When driving in the city, paying for roadside or garage parking is a norm, quickly adding up to a hefty bill. Neil Jin (I) echoes this concern: "My parents didn't want to pay for insurance or buy a new car, so I didn't get a driver's license."

Besides the high cost, learning to drive also places a time burden on already-busy students. Aside from driving courses, which can take place multiple times a week for multiple months, students must also accrue 40 hours of supervised driving. Many students who were polled in our survey expressed annoyances over this time commitment and explained that it prevents them from learning to drive. Jin comments, "It is very annoying to schedule driving lessons, and I didn't want to go through that hassle." For juniors and seniors get-

ting ready for college, time is at a premium. Learning to drive just puts one more thing onto their already-full plate.

Alternatives to driving make these costs extremely hard to justify. For a high schooler in the city, there are not many opportunities where driving is necessary. Many teachers do not even own cars. BLS math teacher Mx. Grace Foulis explains that they "take the T and the buses. I walk a lot [...] or I [take an] *Uber*."

These alternatives are not only a fraction of the price, but are also more practical. Gregory Ware (II) adds, "I live in a city with [...] a lot of easily accessible public transport, and I have a OneCard that [...] gives me free access to it anytime I want."

Public transportation, especially trains, is a more environmentally friendly way to travel. According to *Our World in Data*, "Public transport is usually your best option if you can't walk or cycle. Trains are particularly low-carbon ways to travel. Taking a train instead of a car for medium-length distances would reduce emissions by around 80 [percent]." Free public transportation is a cheaper, more accessible and more eco-friendly way for BLS students to travel on their own.

When high school students become drivers, they send a message to politicians that Americans continue to support the car industry. This causes politicians to continue supporting car dependent infrastructure and ignore the massive environmental problems the industry brings. All this contributes to the country's role as the world's second highest emitter of greenhouse gasses.

Some people may say that learning to drive fosters responsibility and emotional regulation. These skills, however, can be learned elsewhere. When high school students take tests, they learn to keep their emotions in control in a high stress environment. Summer and school year jobs also teach students to be responsible and mature.

Taking public transport, walking, biking or an occasional *Uber* allows students to retain their freedom of movement around the city while mitigating many of the costs and adverse environmental effects associated with driving. Despite what adults and society may lead you to believe, learning to drive as a teenager is not important.

Protect the Right to Peacefully Protest

In the past year, academic institutions have been the centers of activism, witnessing a multitude of protests over various issues. Demonstrations over the Israel-Palestine conflict have been especially prominent, with students across the country participating in occupations, walkouts, encampments or sit-ins. Even students from Boston Latin School have participated in multiple walk-outs. Many argue that such activism causes disruptions and fosters divisions within school communities. History and modern society, however, highlight that protests are essential in academic settings, as they cultivate a culture of free speech and activism.

For decades, activism on academic campuses has played a crucial role in major social movements. In the 1950s, during the Civil Rights Movement, students challenged segregation and discrimination against Black Americans through marches, sit-ins and protests. In the 1960s, during the Vietnam War,

campuses spread ideas of anti-war sentiment to the public by expressing their opposition through demonstrations. In the 1970s and 1980s, protests were held against apartheid in South Africa, further solidifying academic institutions as platforms for social change. These historic movements emphasize the pivotal role student activism has in advancing societal progress.

BLS history teacher Ms. Paula Bowles adds, "Peaceful acts of civil disobedience, like protests and sit-ins are a time honored tradition in academic environments, both in high school and in college. Civil disobedience, in the spirit of Thoreau, Gandhi and King, can be an educational tool and a way to bring attention to an issue, whether global, national or local."

The ability to protest and express free speech is fundamental in a democratic society, and academic campuses are no exception. The First Amendment guarantees this right, which can be exercised within educational institutions allowing for civic engagement. Engaging in activism teaches students

advocate for change and how to communicate and defend their opinions.

"While I can see how some might think that protests and activism could distract from schools' core curriculum," Ilana Schwartz (III) explains, "I have always seen education to be inextricably linked to being up to date on current events and problems of the time, as well as learning effective ways to make your voice heard and make change."

Protests at world-renowned universities also attract significant media attention, heightening awareness of critical issues. With students at prestigious institutions like Columbia University, Yale University and Massachusetts Institute of Technology protesting, issues draw national and international observation. This amplification in attention facilitates and leads to broader discussions and potential policy changes, further supporting the idea that academic institutions are ideal platforms for spreading awareness.

Despite the benefits, some argue that protests do not belong in academic settings because they can disrupt learning. Demonstrations often interrupt classes, exams and schedules, leading to inconvenience and stress for many students. Moreover, protests might create an "us versus them" mentality within the school community, which creates a counterproductive learning atmosphere.

In light of these disruptions, universities and colleges have responded to protests in various ways. Some institutions have designated zones for protests to minimize disruptions, while others have responded through mass arrests and the detainment of students.

Ms. Bowles reminds that a core part of effective non-violent protesting is accepting punishment: "[C]ivil disobedience is not without personal risk and consequences [...] Students

who engage in acts of protest should be ready and willing to accept the consequences of their actions, including suspensions, removals from campus or more with the hope that the consequences they receive could bring more needed attention to the cause they care deeply about."

While receiving consequences is an important part of nonviolent protest, the punishments should come from universities, not police. "I haven't seen any pushback from organizations in person," says Phineas Manasselatham (I), an active protestor for the Black Lives Matter movement and pro-Palestine movement, "but I have seen a lot of violence from police." If universities want to punish students, that is fair. If they ban certain chants, prevent outsiders from coming onto campus or even block students from graduating, that is fair. But when universities call in outside police to quell nonviolent protest. By not directly dealing with students, they signal that they do not wish to engage students' feelings and thoughts about the most pressing issues of the present day. This undermines the civic engagement, free speech and academic debate that these institutions aim to uphold.

Furthermore, when police are called in, violent scenes often unfold and quickly dominate the media, overshadowing the core issues that are being protested, such as calls for cease-fire. When administrators have instead taken on the role of communicating, mediating and punishing students themselves, safety and order are maintained while respecting the protest process

Protesting is an essential right for all students as it allows them to exercise their freedom of speech to fight for changes they want. For universities to truly cultivate the leaders of the future, they must remain a place where non-violent protest is allowed.

Stop the "Bowlification" of Restaurants!

Pizza bowls, poke bowls, *Chipotle* bowls, *CAVA* bowls, *Chinese* bowls — name a type of bowl — it exists. The bowl meal, consisting of grains, vegetables and a protein, has been present in the United States for years, but only recently has it become ubiquitous.

Many praise the bowl for its ultra-convenience and speed. The wait time is low and the food can be eaten quickly. This convenience, however, comes with a cost.

The purpose of eating should not be to maximize nutrient intake while minimizing time spent eating. The "bowlification" of cuisines has turned the pleasure of eating delicious food into a streamlined, automated process in an effort to ensure efficient nutrient delivery. Eating at restaurants that use this bowl model is not an enjoyable, social experience, but rather a mere task demanded by society for survival. The value placed on time efficiency over pleasure and taste indeed reflects the rise of hustle culture in today's world, with people preferring to scarf down food as quickly as possible instead of chatting with staff and fellow custom-

On top of that, the bowl often dilutes the authenticity of real food. Chipotle, for example, offers a heavily Americanized version of Mexican food. Founded by Steve Ells, a white man with a predominately white executive team, Chipotle has often been criticized for claims of cultural appropriation. Menu items, such as barbacoa, often do not encompass the actual dish, and without an explicit explanation of how Chipotle alters the traditional cuisine, the audience loses out on learning about the culture behind the dish. One cannot help but ask themselves whether the convenience is worth diluting real Mexican food, especially when so many authentic options exist.

It's not just Chipotle — the bowl model's range has been extended to almost everything, even including Chinese food. One example of a place that claims to have Chinese bowls is Junzi; yet they fail at providing real authentic Chinese cuisine. Sarah Cao (V) explains, "[Junzi bowls] are Chinese-American. If you went to China, they would [ask], 'What is that?' People say that they had Chinese food, but they just had the adapted version."

Bowls, furthermore, oversimplify or outright ignore the techniques and significance behind traditional dishes. Dumpling bowls, for example, which consist of dumpling filling and rice mixed together with other dishes, destroy the cultural significance of the dish. Dumplings have meaning: they are supposed to represent good fortune and unity. Making them and sharing them with loved ones carries a deep cultural

significance. A typical Chinese dinner might be three plates of dumplings on the table with some sauce. When bowl restaurants throw dumplings into a bowl with other Chinese foods, they sacrifice the intended way to eat the meal for the sake of appearing trendy.

BLS Chinese teacher Ms. Muqing Gu shares how bowls decimate traditions associated with Chinese cuisine. She asserts, "[You] cannot say that [it] is Chinese food. If you want authentic Chinese food, then go to the country. They can make it for you there." While

fusion can be innovative and contain the essence of two or more cultures, bowls fail to do so because they dilute any culture into a mix of easily replicable food.

Bowls offer a convenient and seemingly healthy dining option, but they also pose a threat to the authenticity of traditional cuisines. Consumers must be mindful of their food choices and support restaurants selling authentic cuisine or only fusion places that are upfront about their practice of blending food traditions.

Stay Rooted in STEM

Everyone at Boston Latin School has undoubtedly heard the question: what do you want to study in college? In the past, most students at BLS would have answered law, politics or government, as the curriculum was focused on humanities. Now, however, responses nationwide have shifted toward computer science, engineering or chemistry. This trend has spread to BLS. It is not surprising that a majority of BLS seniors have declared a STEM major: according to the data collected by the BLS 2024 Commits Instagram page, 50.8 percent of the Class of 2024 have chosen to go into STEM. With the spike of interest in STEM comes the crash of a different major: humanities, the umbrella covering all of human society and culture from art to history. This trend is reflected in the BLS Class of 2024: only 16.1 percent of them plan to major in liberal arts.

Although mourned by enthusiasts of the humanities, in a time of constant innovation, the spotlight on majors in STEM is valid, as they yield long-term security and practicality.


BLS math teacher Ms. Alyssa Sarkis comments, "If we're thinking about [STEM] and how fast [it is] progressing, there's clearly a market for that, and people see that as jobs or as a vital part of their life, and they want to be involved in that development."

STEM majors, moreover, earn 17,000 to 24,000 more dollars, on average, than non-STEM majors, which highlights the appeal for occupations in the field. STEM workers generally provide more tangible services — everyone can see how doctors are helpful — and their qualifications are concrete. The value of humanities, conversely, is not only harder to quantify but also subjective; its value depends on the consumer, and the careers humanities majors could pursue are vague.

BLS science teacher Ms. Gina Castellanos Ellsworth explains, "The bottom line is that a company that generates billions of dollars has more money to pay for top talent."

These more clearly defined job requirements assure a clearer career path — a welcome prospect for the newly graduated. A pre-medical student, for example, knows that medical school will always be an option for them; a computer science major knows they can find a job at a tech company. In short, a STEM major gives students the "safer" option: guaranteed work that pays well.

That is not to say that the humanities do not have



value, as the interpersonal skills provided in the field are necessary in all lines of work.

BLS history teacher Ms. Clara Webb asserts, "There's so much that goes into making something successful, and [companies] need all kinds of skills."

This applies to STEM as well, as even the most brilliant minds still need leaders who can sell their vision to others. Even outside of a STEM lens, humanities has its importance. Ms. Webb contends, "Pure humanities careers do exist, and they do have a value," She continues, "[They are] about understanding 'How did we get here?' and 'Who are we?' [...] I don't think that's ever going to go away." Humanities are what make us inherently human — the love that goes into art can't be replicated in a lab.

There is a hard line, however, between passion and practicality. Higher education is expensive, and even with scholarships, it is important that the selected major is worth the investment. Humanities can be found everywhere, not just in a classroom. One does not need a humanities degree to learn empathy or teamwork. The major someone chooses does not define their entire identity,

either

"[Majors] are not the only dimension," Ms. Webb clarifies. "You can certainly pursue [humanities] even if it isn't your major in college." If someone can major in something while balancing additional interests, it is objectively better to pursue a higher-paying field. After all, financial stability provides the luxury of maintaining hobbies out of pure interest and not necessity. STEM majors offer more crucial financial and occupational security for a person's livelihood than what humanities could ever provide.

By majoring in STEM, students can have it all—endless work opportunities, a good wage, a solid career path—while still being able to casually pursue their other interests. There is no guaranteed income in subjective fields like the humanities, and people cannot feed themselves with passion alone. Although it may sound shallow, it is better to pursue profitability because money is essential for survival in modern-day society. The dominance that STEM has over the humanities is for the better; the trend will hopefully continue.

Laufey's Bewitched: The Goddess Tour Enchants Boston

On May 7 and 8, Laufey's "Bewitched: The Goddess Tour" came to Boston, where the artist initially began her music career. Known for hits such as "From the Start" and "Goddess," Laufey has recently gained popularity for reintroducing jazz to modern media.

The concerts, held at the Wang Theatre, lasted from around 8:00 P.M. to 10:30 P.M. According to SeatGeek, tickets for the shows reached "as low as 70 dollars with the average price [being] 417 dollars." The performances began with an

Laufey's performances in Boston were especially significant, as Laufey's music career originally began in the city.

At the end of Laufey's performance, she played a special encore song as a tribute to the city called "Street by Street." Hallyu! Korean Pop Culture Makes Waves in the MFA

Over the last century, South Korea has emerged as a global superpower in the worlds of art, music, technology, cosmetics and cinema.

From March 24 to July 28, the Museum of Fine Arts (MFA) is displaying the story behind this rapid rise, known in Korean as *Hallyu*, or the Korean Wave, and its effects on culture. General admission tickets cost 17 dollars for youths seven to 17 years old, but are free for all on Juneteenth on a first-come, first-served basis.

Hallyu! The Korean Wave is a truly unique exhibition, being the "first major exhibition to focus on South Korean pop culture and its worldwide influence."

It houses around 250 objects, ranging from moon jars dating back to the Joseon Dynasty to outfits worn by popular K-pop idols in the 21st century.

The exhibit is split into several sections, each highlighting a unique element of South Korea's pop culture. It starts with the Korean artist PSY's signature pink suit jacket, a homage to the iconic 2012 hit song "Gangnam Style," the first music video on *YouTube* to hit one billion views. Boston Latin School AP Art and Design teacher Ms. Elizabeth Walshak comments, "I remember in 2012 hearing PSY's 'Gangnam Style' and [...] realizing what a hit sensation it was. I think that carved out a space in American pop culture for the influence of Korean media."

A large reason for South Korea's ever growing international cultural in-

fluence is due in part to its swift industrialization process after its devastation in the 20th century, which came from the Japanese occupation and the Korean War. Under military dictatorship, South Korea combated their post-war economic state with rapid societal modernization, juxtaposing new technologies with old traditions, while trying to restrict Western influence. This effort was futile though, since Western pop culture infiltrated South Korea through American military bases, and is now very prevalent in South Korea. In a couple decades, the nation went from being severely impoverished to hosting the 1988 Summer Olympic Games in Seoul and founding huge corporations like Samsung and Hyundai. The MFA surfs on this wave by exhibiting photographs and even old electronic parts from that time of astronomical economic growth.

Of course, the MFA can not introduce Korean pop culture without mentioning K-pop. K-pop is not just comprised of music; it also includes elaborate choreographies, performances, fashion and even reality television. Its massive takeoff from international obscurity is largely due to fans' continued loyalty to their favorite groups and the strict beauty standards that idols must adhere to. Hallyu! The Korean Wave displays outfits worn by popular K-pop idols as well as a collection of light sticks that fans use during concerts.

Other forms of popular Korean entertainment include K-dramas and films. The exhibit features a replica of the bathroom set of the Academy Award and Golden Globe-winning film *Parasite*, as well as the all-too-recognizable outfits from the internet sensation TV show *Squid Game*. South Korea "provided a

unique blend of genres in their films that gradually gained notoriety in the West," s *Hollywood Insider*. Korean shows and movies range from romance to horror, giving viewers many options to choose from.

Being a leading country for technology, it is no surprise that South Korea has also made great advancements in the beauty industry, known as "K-beauty." Currently, it is the third largest exporter of cosmetics in the world. Many Americans use K-beauty due to its affordability, advanced makeup formulas and quality skincare ingredients. Displays and screens presenting reviews of K-beauty products from American and Korean influencers are included in the exhibit, as well as a breakdown of the famous tenstep Korean skincare routine.

The MFA's newest installation also displays modern takes on the *hanbok*, Korea's national costume, which is a traditional garment that dates back thousands of years. People who want to connect to their roots and explore the beauty of the garment attribute to the *hanbok*'s resurgence. The exhibit presents *hanboks* by fashion designers and those that were worn by K-pop idols like RM from BTS.

Whether you are a K-pop and K-drama fan or only know of "Gangnam Style" and Squid Game, the MFA's Hallyu! The Korean Wave exhibit is nothing short of an immersive and enjoyable experience. It layers "the fun and flash with a powerful narrative about the country's triumph over oppression," states the Boston Globe. Ms. Walshak concludes, "This exhibition is a great opportunity to see the connection between the influence of traditional Korean culture and contemporary art and pop culture that has become globally appreciated."

On May 17, Billie Eilish released her third studio album, *Hit Me Hard and Soft*, following weeks of promotion that was kept under wraps with not a single title revealed prior to the album's release. While it is similar to her albums *When We All Fall Asleep, Where Do We Go?* and *Happier Than Ever*, its tracks lived up to the hype. Eilish and her record producer and brother, Finneas, venture into many new sounds, symbolizing a mature shift in her art.

Starting the album is "SKINNY," a slow song about Eilish's insecurities. Despite the lyrics, the song is calming and feels somewhat symphonic and ocean-like.

"LUNCH" follows as the lead single, and its music video was released on the same day as the album. Both the song and the video have a distinct '90s feel.

The third track on this album is "CHIHIRO," named after the protagonist from the 2001 Studio Ghibli film *Spirited Away*. The song utilizes abstract lyrics and haunting sounds, and it can be

described as how one feels when falling. The ghostly feeling it embodies makes it a highlight of the album.

Following this is the trending "BIRDS OF A FEATHER," a happier and more upbeat song about everlasting love. While this track also borrows from '90s music, it is different from "LUNCH," and is more similar to the band The Cardigans.

Track five is "WILDFLOWER," a dramatic and emotional song that leaves the listener feeling heartbroken upon its conclusion. The song is about how one may feel about their partner's ex throughout the relationship. This track also employs a buildup — a feature that is so prominent on this album.

Following "WILDFLOWER" is "THE GREATEST," a slow, rock-influenced track that also uses a buildup, which conveys sadness transforming into anger.

The next track is "L'AMOUR DE MA VIE," yet another song that is split into parts. Its first half is a slow sarcastic ballad where Eilish wishes her former lover the best. The second half is '80s-influenced and upbeat, symbolizing Eilish's happiness over an ended relationship. The switch in the middle of the song makes it stand out.

Song number eight "THE DINER," which is about Eilish's experience with stalkers. The song has a very creepy feeling, as Eilish sings the song from the perspective of a stalker.

The ninth track is "BITTERSUITE," a three-part song where moods change. It depicts the desire to protect yourself while also searching for a relationship.

"Blue" finishes the album, a combination of two unreleased tracks from previous projects. This two-sided song gives off a feeling of distance, allowing the album to end on a pretty yet solemn

Hit Me Hard and Soft is an amazing addition to Eilish's discography, symbolizing the breaking of new ground in her music. It's her most mature album so far; while she incorporates new influences, inspiration from her old works is still evidently present. Though all the tracks released are pivotal to the album's success, the songs that feature split halves all have intricate buildups, so the emotion of the pieces hits harder. Billie and Finneas is still the dynamic duo to be reckoned with, which fans will be able to see for themselves when Eilish performs at TD Garden on October 11, as part of the Hit Me Hard and Soft World Tour.



It's that time of the year again when classes come to a close, but the Black Box curtains open, where the spotlights shine on the cast of Boston

Latin School theatre's annual spring production. This June, BLS theatre is proud to present Mean Girls: The Musical. Aside from the complex technicalities that go into producing a musical, the cast and crew agree that the community formed by working on a largescale project is unparalleled.

Faye Nazarchuk (III) plays Janis, one of the lead characters in the musical. She points out the social component of working on such a character-driven show: "Being in the show is great because I got to meet a bunch of people who I didn't know or haven't talked to before. Then I get to go to rehearsal and have a good time with those people."

Liming anticipates that this year's production will be well loved, "especially because it's geared towards students." There's no doubt that Mean Girls is a staple high school drama that, no matter how overdone, we can all relate to,

Certified Big Three?

When you picture Drake and Kendrick Lamar, who do you think the better artist is? After their recent controversy, it is quite impossible to like both. Though their rocky relationship spans back to 2013, the two artists have recently taken shots at each other through their music over the last few months, with tensions reaching a boiling point.

Kendrick Lamar is an esteemed hip-hop and rap artist who has won the Pulitzer Prize for Music as well as 17 Grammys. Canadian rapper Drake, a pop-rap artist, also has many accolades.

On March 26, artists Future, Metro Boomin and Kendrick Lamar released their single "Like That," which was featured on the album WE DON'T TRUST YOU. In this song, Lamar disses artists J. Cole and Drake, igniting the feud between himself and Drake.

Lamar's lines in "Like That" consisted of the words "Mother **** the big three [...] It's just big me," which was in response to an earlier track made by J. Cole, where he referred to himself, Drake and Lamar as the "big three" of rap. Lamar, however, claimed that neither Drake nor J. Cole could compare to him.

After initially releasing a track in daughter. response to "Like That," J. Cole dropped


out of the feud early. He later removed the track from streaming services and issued an apology. He also publicly apologized at the Dreamville Festival in North Carolina, stating his mental health as the reason he abstained from the beef: "I ain't gonna lie to y'all the past two days felt terrible. I **** near had a relapse."

Drake responded to "Like That" in April with "Push Ups," where he mocked Lamar's record deal history and small

Lamar responded quickly in the same month with "Euphoria," where he took shots at Drake's biracialism, calling Drake "not a colleague" but a "colonizer." He also rapped about Drake's fashion sense and alleged claims concerning his relations with various women.

Drake then released Matters" on May 3, where he accused Lamar's fiancée, Whitney Alford, of infidelity. He also accused Lamar of domestic abuse against Alford and called Lamar's son a product of Alford and her bodyguard: "I heard that one of 'em little kids might be Dave Free."

Lamar fired back in less than an hour with "Meet the Grahams," a sinister track that consisted of verses addressing Drake's son Adonis whilst also accusing Drake of having a secret

feel like the text messages between him and Millie Bobby Brown were questionable for sure," while referring to Drake's interaction with the young actress.

The beef has even drawn international attention, with artists singing in Chinese and Japanese on "BBL Drizzy," an instrumental track produced by Metro Boomin, getting its name from the alleged Brazilian butt lift Drake got. Metro Boomin made this track in response because of this but also because of his Abraham Coumbassa (II) says, "I to Drake's line "make some drums" in renown."

With fans branching across different platforms, it is clear that Lamar has gathered more support for his side. Balancing Sports and Academics On and Off the Field

Struggling to find the right balance between sports and academics is something that almost all Boston Latin School student-athletes struggle with. BLS is synonymous with a heavy workload and rigorous academic curriculum, which often doesn't leave much time for an emphasis on sports.

Most BLS sports compete in the Massachusetts Interscholastic Athletic Association (MIAA) Division I (D-I) and some, like the boys' hockey team this year, have even won the state championships. So what makes athletes' schedules so busy, and how do BLS

student-athletes manage to keep up such high levels of performance, both on and off the field?

A primary reason as to why student's schedules are so busy is the lack of field space. Even though BLS is located near many fields, such as Clemente, Carter and Sweeney Field, BLS athletes are rarely permitted to use them. This creates a struggle regarding transportation and practice space.

For instance, soccer players have been forced to make the trek to West Roxbury High School, often without a bus. This is an experience shared by baseball players, who use the same home field. The hockey team plays and practices in South Boston, and the ten-

nis team doesn't even have designated home courts.

It is important to note that BLS's suburban competitors in the Dual County League are all able to practice and play on fields at school and thus save valuable time.

Alex Greene Barrios (I) has been a fouryear varsity athlete on both the wrestling and soccer teams. He claims that, "The BLS workload is not designed to accommodate athletice."

When considering the amount of time sports and athletics take up, it is no surprise some athletes struggle to make time for schoolwork. Multi-sport varsity athlete Benjamin Davison (II) reflects on his time playing

varsity sports and the impact commuting has had on his student-athlete experience, "Transportation is a big factor, where due to our lack of home fields and practice resources on school campus, we have to commute much further than other schools [...] Practices are usually two hours longer or an hour longer just because of commuting times, which cuts into time to do homework."

The School's student-athletes often find ways to get around these extreme scenarios. Students often suggest taking free time in school, such as studies or W block to do work.

The busy schedule, however, does not curb student-athletes' love for sports. Greene Barrios will continue his wrestling career at the Division III collegiate level and Max Deane (I) will continue his track career at Boston College, a D-I powerhouse.

When asked about the stress of the college recruiting process on top of an already busy schedule, Deane notes, "Although my recruitment process started later than the traditional path, I was able to get a lot done during the summer." Prioritizing sports and academics during the school year and designating outside time to focus on the recruitment process could be a useful strategy for student-athletes.

Greene Barrios adds, "[The college recruiting process is] very involved. Since college sports are so competitive, I really had to market myself and do all the outreach to coaches. Sending in film, transcripts, accolades as well as calling and emailing coaches took up a large part of the early process." He explains, "[My] process was made significantly easier by having good grades. Many of these coaches ask for your grades before even bothering to see your qualities as an athlete because coaches want reliable athletes who would be accepted into the school and eligible to compete their whole time there."

Despite the rigorous academic curriculum, being a student-athlete at BLS will have its benefits. Younger student-athletes should make note of the importance in having good grades for college recruitment, since academics are a huge part of college, regardless of an athlete's ability on the field; academics can be the make-or-break factor.

BLS Tennis Serves Up a Successful Season

The Boston Latin School girls' varsity tennis team has yet again proved itself as an athletic powerhouse, serving up another triumphant season this spring. Messi's Major League Magic Transforms U.S. Soccer

Lionel Messi is often referred to as the best soccer player of all time. Messi began his soccer journey in 1995, when he joined Newell Old Boys academy in Rosario, Argentina. At the age of 13, Messi moved to Spain to play for Futbol Club Barcelona, where he debuted for the first team at 16.

Messi went on to star in matches for Barcelona and Argentina, winning many major awards in the process. During his time on such teams, Messi won the Champions League four times, gold at the Beijing Olympic Games in 2008 and most recently, the International Federation of Association Football World Cup.

Following financial trouble at Barcelona, Messi joined Paris Saint-Germain in 2021 before transferring to Major League Soccer's (MLS) Inter Miami in 2023. In Miami, he has played 25 matches, scoring 23 goals. Messi currently receives a guaranteed salary of 20.45 million dollars in addition to an ownership stake in the club.

Messi's arrival in the United States has led to an extraordinary amount of new interest in MLS, especially for Inter Miami. The arrival of Messi has increased attendance in league matches, setting new records across the league.

At Chicago Fire's Soldier Field,

62,214 fans attended a match, 72,610 went to Sporting Kansas's Arrowhead Stadium and 65,612 were present at the New England Revolution's Gillette Stadium on April 27 of this year.

Wolfpack soccer player Brendan Hobbs (I) acknowledges the true scope of Messi and Inter Miami's influence. He comments, "I have been to just about every Revolution game this season and there were roughly 20,000 people at each game." Hobbs goes on to describe the match between Inter Miami and the Revolution: "I was there, sitting in the section where Messi walked out, and the energy was night and day different from normal. It was much more energetic. A lot of that energy, however, went into supporting Messi, rather than the Revolution."

Los Angeles Galaxy's Dignity Health Sports Park sold out against Inter Miami within six minutes of tickets being released. Just before the match, tickets were being resold for 1,500 dollars, an unprecedented price for the MLS. Even with these unmatched statistics, the debate of Messi versus Cristiano Ronaldo rages on.

39-year-old Ronaldo made a similar career move to Messi, following an extremely successful career at Spain's Real Madrid, where he became regarded as the best goalscorer in history. Ronaldo declined the MLS in favor of a move to Al Nassr Football Club in Saudi Arabia for 200 million dollars a

BLS Classics teacher and Arsenal Football Club fan Mr. Salvatore Bartoloma shares, "Ronaldo to me is more of a spectacle." He goes on to compare the two superstars: "Messi is the guy who shows up to work with his lunch pail and puts in a solid eight hours [...] Ronaldo shows up in a tuxedo when everyone else is in work pants." Mr. Bartoloma believed that Messi has not had as much of an impact on American soccer, further analogizing, "If Lebron decided to play for Serbia, all of Serbia would stop what they're do-

ing for the day and marvel at this."

Messi fans were ecstatic at hearing his move and were quick to support the Argentine. Upon hearing Messi coming to the MLS, soccer player and longtime fan Leila Ohashi (III) states, "I was excited! It gives me and other soccer players a chance to see him in-person, which is really special. I think that Messi's transfer to the MLS has brought more attention to soccer in the US, which will help promote the sport for younger players and encourage the development of soccer in the US in general."






